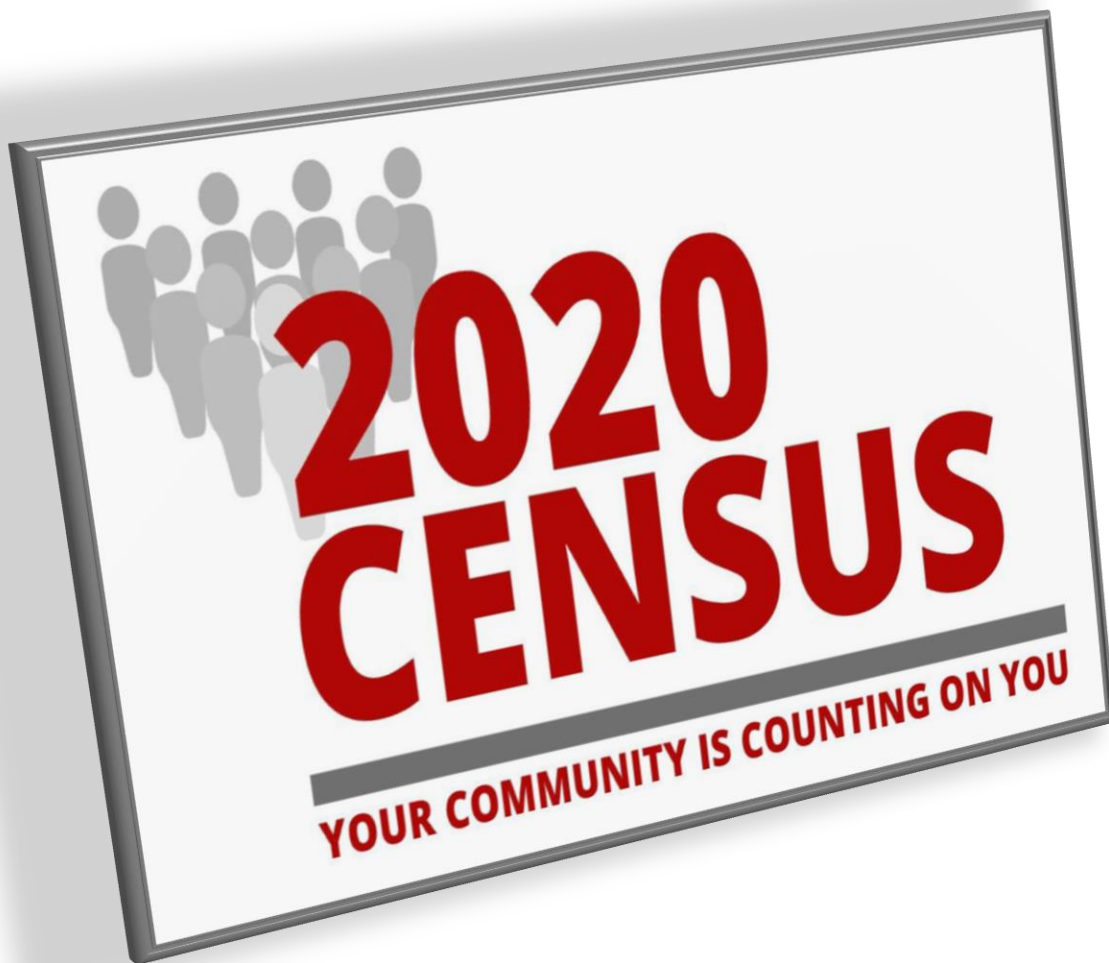

Census Bureau Sends 2020 Census Reminder Before Census Takers Visit. Have you been counted in the 2020 Census?

As of June 25, 59.5 percent of households in Phoenix responded to the census, statewide 58.3 percent, and nationally 61.7 percent of households have responded.

The U.S. Census Bureau announced that it will send an [additional reminder postcard](#) to households that have not yet responded to the 2020 Census. The postcard is scheduled to arrive between July 22 and July 28, a few weeks before census takers are set to begin visiting most households that haven't responded. Please take the time to respond to the 2020 Census.

Face Coverings Required

Update: The Maricopa County Board of Supervisors issued an order for all of Maricopa County that includes persons over the age of two to wear face coverings in public. The County Order does apply to Phoenix and amends the age requirement of the Phoenix declaration.

MICRO-BUSINESSES RESOURCES

Million-dollar grants remain for Phoenix microenterprises.

The City of Phoenix calls for small business owners to apply for microenterprise grants in Phoenix. The aid fund still has a minimum of \$ 8 million to distribute.



- The Phoenix Microbusiness Resiliency Grant is open to businesses located anywhere in the city with five or fewer employees and under \$1 million in 2019 gross sales. Microbusinesses can have brick and mortar addresses, be a home-based business or a mobile business. [Phoenix Micro Business Resiliency Grant](#)
- The Phoenix IDA Small Business Relief Grant offers as much as \$10,000 for qualifying small businesses located in, and adjoining, low-income neighborhoods in the city. Businesses must have had fewer than 25 employees on March 1, 2020, and calendar year 2019 gross sales of under \$3 million. [Small Business Relief Grants](#)
- Phoenix Restaurant Restart Resiliency Grants applications are open. The grant helps cover the costs of reopening a restaurant by September 1, 2020. Restaurants with fixed Phoenix locations and food trucks headquartered in Phoenix are eligible to apply for the grant. [Phoenix Restaurant Restart Resiliency Grant](#)

The City of Phoenix has opened up the Commercial City Services Bill Relief Grant. Phoenix businesses affected by COVID 19 that have a commercial City Services account may be eligible for financial assistance with water and sewer expenses. PHOENIX PUBLIC TRANSIT

In accordance with Phoenix City Council action taken June 19, as of Saturday, June 20, transit passengers are required to wear face coverings to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Previous Council direction was a transit-specific policy effective July 1; however, due to the latest Council action directed citywide, face coverings are now required as of June 20. To assist transit passengers who do not have a face covering in their possession, Phoenix Public Transit staff will provide face coverings beginning June 22 (as supplies allow) for riders at the following transit centers:

- Central Station (Central Ave./Van Buren St.)
- Ed Pastor (Central Ave./Broadway Rd.)
- Metrocenter (Metrocenter Mall)
- Sunnyslope (3rd St./Dunlap Ave.)



Face coverings will not be distributed on public transit vehicles, although distribution may occur in the coming weeks at additional city facilities as supplies allow. Further information on Phoenix social media channels and website will provide details on when and where additional mask distribution will take place.

Riders are urged to plan ahead and bring their own face covering, which may include masks, face shields, homemade cloth coverings or other cloth positioned to cover the mouth and nose. Detailed information on the use of face coverings, including how to make your own at home, can be found at the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention \(CDC\)](https://www.cdc.gov) website.

The face-covering requirement applies to all people two years of age and older in the city of Phoenix, when they leave their home or residence and are within six feet of another person who is not a family member or member of their household. There are exceptions for those who should not wear a face covering due to a medical or mental health condition and for those whose religious beliefs prevent them from wearing a face covering. In many cases, it is not apparent who is exempted, riders encouraged not to get involved with other passengers who are not wearing a face covering. Public transit personnel will be instructed not to prevent riders who do not have a face covering from boarding or riding. PHOENIX BUS RAPID TRANSIT

In 2015, Phoenix voters approved Proposition 104, creating the 35-year street and transit plan known as [Transportation 2050 or T2050](#). **Bus Rapid Transit (BRT)** was identified as a key component of T2050 to continue expanding our city's high capacity transit network.

As a new transit option for Phoenix, BRT will transform and improve transit speed, reliability and overall rider experience. [Phoenix BRT](#) will be developed based on where current and future transit ridership shows the most need and lots of community input.

PHOENIX FIREWORKS



A.R.S. allows Fire Prevention to permit and inspect sales locations based on the quantities of consumer fireworks for sale.

"Permissible consumer fireworks" allowed by A.R.S.

Ground and handheld sparkling devices, cylindrical fountains, cone fountains, illuminating torches, wheels, ground spinners, flitter sparklers, toy smoke devices, wire sparklers or dipped sticks, multiple tube ground and handheld sparkling devices, cylindrical fountains, cone fountains and illuminating torches.

A.R.S. **prohibits** any consumer firework that is intended to rise into the air and explode or to detonate in the air or to fly above the ground, including firework items defined and known as firecrackers, bottle rockets, sky rockets, missile-type rockets, helicopters, aerial spinners, torpedoes, roman candles, mine devices, shell devices and aerial shell kits or reloadable tubes.

Fireworks retail sales inspections

A.R.S. allows Fire Prevention to permit and inspect sales locations based on the quantities of consumer fireworks for sale. Fire Prevention inspects the various tents around the City of Phoenix that sell consumer fireworks to ensure the tents are compliant with the fire code, and the maximum allowable fireworks quantities are not exceeded. Each consumer fireworks sales location is required to have a fire inspection if they exceed the permissible quantities of consumer fireworks.

The Phoenix Fire Code prohibits the use and sale of consumer fireworks in the City of Phoenix. However, Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S. or state law) prohibits the City of Phoenix from enforcing the ordinance relating to permissible consumer fireworks during the following dates:

- A.R.S. allows consumer fireworks **sales** between:
 - April 25 through May 6
 - May 20 through July 6
 - December 10 through January 3
- A.R.S. allows consumer fireworks **use** between:
 - May 4 through May 6
 - June 24 through July 6
 - December 24 through January 3

PORTABLE SIGNS HELP DRIVERS AVOID I-17 WORK ZONE IN PHOENIX

Displays of travel times often support I-10 as quicker route

To help drivers avoid delays approaching an Interstate 17 work zone south of downtown Phoenix, the Arizona Department of Transportation is using portable message signs that display travel times for the optional Interstate 10 route that can save commuters several minutes.

The electronic signs, located on trailers, show estimated travel times for I-17, where the freeway is narrowed for bridge reconstruction at Central Avenue, as well as travel times for I-10 between the “Stack” interchange and the “Split” near Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport.

The I-10 detour route in the downtown area recently has been saving drivers at least 5 minutes compared to the stretch of I-17 where the bridge over Central Avenue is being reconstructed. I-17 traffic is limited to two lanes in each direction in that area.

Signs are located along westbound I-10 approaching the I-17 Split near the airport as well as along southbound I-17 and eastbound I-10 in areas approaching the Stack.

ADOT arranged for use of the electronic signs while planning for the \$13.5 million bridge project at Central Avenue. Work to reconstruct the bridge started in May and is scheduled for completion in fall 2021.

The portable sign system uses traffic data to calculate the estimated travel times to predetermined destinations, much like on most permanent message boards along Valley freeways.

As part of the “Smart Work Zones” pilot project, portable message boards also have been placed in areas along I-10 approaching interchanges connecting to the new Loop 202 South Mountain Freeway. Those signs also provide drivers with estimated travel times for using either Loop 202 or I-10 through the downtown Phoenix region.

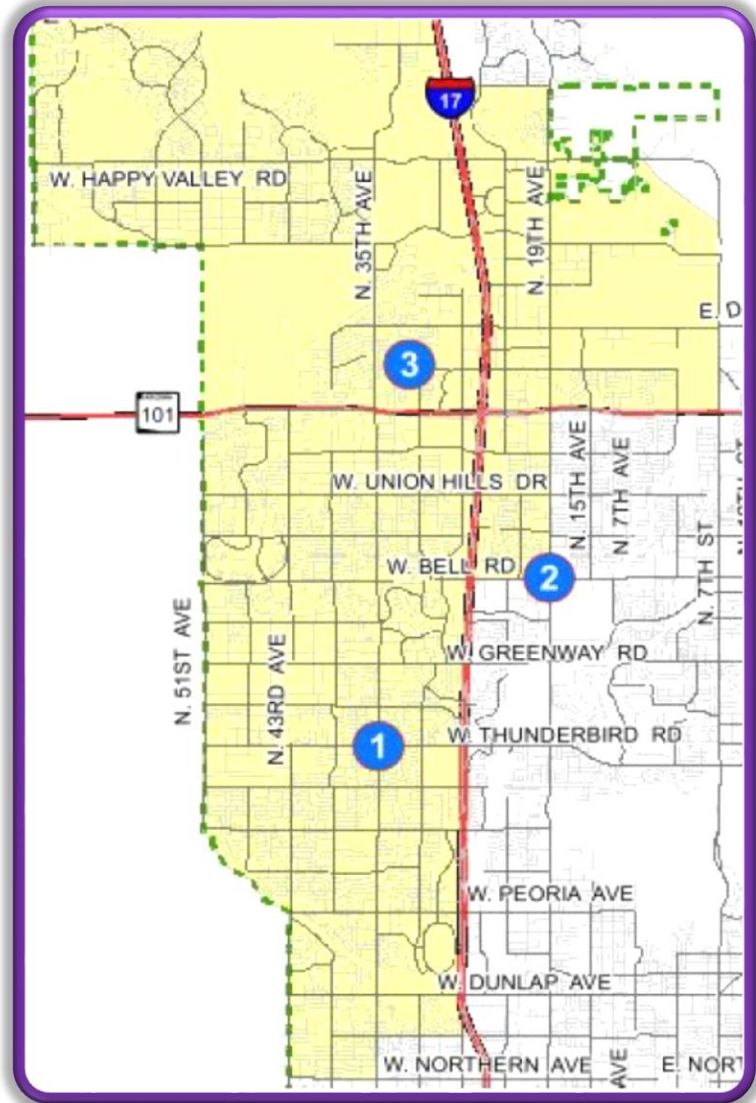

PUBLIC COMMENT ENDS JULY 1

Neighborhood Notification: Bicycle Improvements on Stetson Hills Loop from Happy Valley Road (43rd Avenue) to Happy Valley Road (39th Avenue)

As part of the Street Transportation Department's core mission, we strive to improve the City's roadways to create a safe and efficient transportation network. Our ongoing pavement maintenance program provides opportunities to change the current traffic lane striping to improve safety for people who walk, drive, ride bicycles and use transit.

About the Project

Where: Stetson Hills Loop from Happy Valley Road (43rd Avenue) to Happy Valley Road (39th Avenue).

What: Where there is enough space on the roadway, buffered bicycle lanes, a parking lane and a two-way left turn lane will be added. The number of travel lanes will remain the same.

When: Pavement maintenance (new asphalt) is scheduled for late summer / early fall 2020 and traffic lane striping improvements will happen shortly after.

Why: Buffers add space between people driving and people walking or biking, increasing protection from vehicles, improving safety and adding comfort. Additionally, the slight narrowing of the lane widths to accommodate the buffers will help to guide cars and deter speeding.
