

CITY EFFORTS Fiscal Year 2020-21

MAJOR INITIATIVES

- The city of Phoenix spends just under **\$19 million annually** (see reverse) for services related to homeless solutions across several city departments:
 - Housing Department
 - Human Services Department
 - Neighborhood Services Department
 - Parks and Recreation Department
 - Police Department
 - Public Works Department
 - Street Transportation Department
- Phoenix dedicates over \$4 million for services (see reverse) to assist those experiencing homelessness through community-based providers.

Direct services include:

- Homeless outreach and engagement
- Veteran navigation and coordination
- Emergency shelter
- Rent and utility deposits assistance
- Wrap-around support
- Permanent supportive housing
- Eviction prevention and utility assistance
- Housing and Shelter Partnerships
- The city partners with shelter providers last year assisted
 3,680 individuals and families experiencing homelessness with emergency shelter services.
- Additionally, Phoenix utilizes a variety of federal housing resources to provide housing and stabilization. These resources includes:
 - 900 VASH (veteran-supportive) vouchers
 - **275+** Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers for chronically homeless
 - 50+ project-based Section 8 Vouchers for families with children
 - **33** units with supportive services at the Aeroterra Apartment Community
- Phoenix also developed a partnership with Mercy Maricopa Integrated Care, to provide behavioral health and wrap around support services to those transitioning out of chronic homelessness with the help of the Section 8 Housing Choice vouchers.

EMERGENCY INITIATIVES

The city of Phoenix allocated more than **\$50.2 million** to further address homelessness in our community.

These Community
Development Block Grant
(CDBG) and Emergency
Services Grant (ESG) funds
were made available to the
city through the federal
CARES Act, passed by
Congress in response to the
issues created by Covid-19.

\$16.7 million in ESG and CDBG dollars will be used to increase the number of available beds at the Project Haven shelter, expand Rapid Rehousing programs for families, women and men, as well \$10.5 million to purchase a new facility for US Vets and additional funds to cover operating costs at the new shelter.

Plans also include additional resources for the downtown Human Services Campus, \$14 million to fund acquisition or improvement of up to four shelters, and more than \$9 million to support organizations that provide services to people experiencing homelessness.

REGIONAL FACTS

- The only publicly available Coordinated Entry location in Maricopa County for homeless individuals is located in the city of Phoenix at the Human Services Campus Brian Garcia Welcome Center which is located within the city of Phoenix.
- The total number of emergency shelter beds in Maricopa County is **1,825** of which approximately **1,513** beds or **83** percent are located within the city of Phoenix.
